

Dear Friends,

One particular event of this past year reminded the SLM Community of its early days and the strong vision of its founder, Episcopal Priest, Father James Jones. In the mid 1950's, the late Thomas and Elizabeth Edmonds of Christ Church in Winnetka were quite taken with Father Jones' revolutionary idea of providing housing for those leaving jail. They established a trust which yielded a little over a million dollars to St. Leonard's this past May. In addition to greatly reducing the remaining capital debt for the Michael Barlow Center, the funds were used for staff bonuses and a number of other immediate needs.

The vision of Father Jones, which so impressed Mr. & Mrs. Edmonds, remains at the heart of all that is accomplished through St. Leonard's Ministries. We believe, as did Father Jones and his early followers, that men and women exiting prison are at a critical time in their lives. If we can reach them quickly with life-giving possibilities, the likelihood of returning to prison is dramatically reduced. Society's response to incarceration and SLM's response to the needs of those exiting prison have changed greatly, but the message of hope still prevails.

Without the generosity of all of SLM's many friends and benefactors, continuing to provide a setting for this message of hope would be impossible. Whether you share in the Mission of St. Leonard's as a volunteer, a donor, an interested friend or just someone out there who appreciates what we do, we remain deeply grateful to you for your presence with us during this past fiscal year and we look forward to your continued presence with us in the next year.

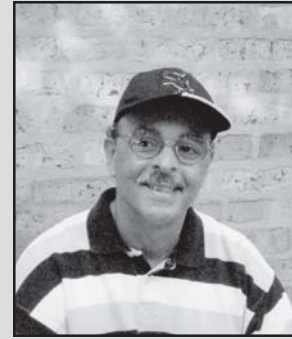
St. Leonard's House

2100 W. Warren Boulevard, Chicago, IL 60612

St. Leonard's House is an interim housing with program for adult men exiting prison with no other resources with which to begin a process of successful re-entry into the community. Eight new residents were Special Needs clients. Case management, individual and group counseling, workshops and referrals address medical and mental health needs, anger management, substance abuse and relapse prevention, employment and education, life skills, housing issues, relationships, parenting and family reunification. During FY '07, 162 men received services.

Of the 125 who exited:

- 68% completed education, vocational training and/or employment prep programs.
- 84% were able to remain drug and alcohol free during residency.
- 84% obtained permanent independent or supportive housing.
- 50% increased income through employment or appropriate benefits.



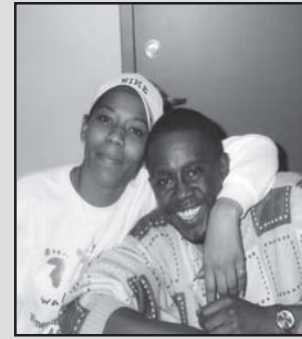
Grace House

1801 West Adams Street, Chicago, IL 60612

Grace House is an interim housing with program for adult women exiting prison with no other resources with which to begin a process of successful re-entry into the community. Individual and group counseling, workshops and referrals address medical and mental health needs, anger management, addiction and relapse prevention, abuse issues, employment and education, life skills, housing issues, relationships, parenting and family reunification. During FY '07, 48 women received services.

Of the 31 who exited:

- 68% completed education, vocational training and/or employment prep programs.
- 75% were able to remain drug and alcohol free during residency.
- 68% obtained permanent independent or supportive housing.
- 65% increased income through employment or appropriate benefits.



St. Andrew's Court

50 N. Hoyne Street, Chicago, IL 60612

St. Andrew's Court is permanent supportive housing for otherwise homeless adult men who have completed the St. Leonard's House program and are ill, disabled, chronically addicted or not quite ready for total independence. Through individual counseling and case management, outreach, advocacy and referrals for needed services, each resident is encouraged to develop as much independence as possible. During FY '07, 60 men received services.

Of the 39 who exited:

- 51% completed education, vocational training and/or employment prep programs.
- 74% were able to remain drug and alcohol free during residency.
- 51% obtained permanent independent or supportive housing.
- 36% increased income through employment or appropriate benefits.

Michael Barlow Center

2120 W. Warren Boulevard, Chicago, IL 60612

Michael Barlow Center is an employment and education center serving formerly incarcerated men and women in homeless service programs or at risk of becoming homeless. The Center provides a pre-employment program, skills training programs, a high school completion program, literacy and tutoring, computer skills training and an open lab, individual job development assistance, retention counseling and follow-up. During FY '07, 224 men and women received services.

- 168 individuals enrolled for Job Development services
- 76% enrolled in the Food Service program completed it.
- 74% enrolled in the Building Maintenance program completed it.
- 89% enrolled in the pre-employment program completed it.
- 224 individuals used the computer lab for PC classes, research and/or assignments.
- 89% enrolled in the High School program completed it.
- 75 individuals participated in high school prep classes.
- 99 individuals participated in individual and/or group tutoring from literacy to high school and college assistance.
